#### THREE SISTERS



The cast of Three Sisters

Rehearsals for Chekhov's famous tragedy, 'Three Sisters' is well underway. Directed by Mary King, the show follows the lives of three sisters in Russia, 1900, full of hope and youth, longing to return to the thrill of Moscow. But the challenges of love, family, power and secrets will change their lives more then they could have imagined. We got together with two cast members, Mery Sutherland and Quillan Mitchell, to find out more.

#### Tell us a bit about your characters.

**QUILLAN**: The character I play is André, he is the brother of thee sisters and husband to Natasha. He wants to be a university but is stuck as a member of the council in the small town where the play takes place.

**MERY:** I play Natasha, who is married to Andrey and becomes sister-in-law to the titular 'Three sisters'. Initially she is mocked and teased by the other characters due to her class and horrible fashion sense; yet, the tables turn as she gains authority, becoming a wife and mother and developing a brash personality.

# The show is extremely naturalistic. How is playing a naturalistic character different from other characters you've played?

**QUILLAN**: It's very different to what I have done previously. A couple of the characters that I have had the opportunity to play in the past have been comedic, and even when I have played more naturalistic roles they have still had larger than life personalities.I enjoy playing parts like this very much, I find it fun to play entertaining characters and I like working with other actors in comedic scenes, i have found it a bit odd playing a naturalistic part and it has taken some getting used too, however I am enjoying the opportunity to develop a character that is more grounded in reality and less caricature.

**MERY:** Natasha has been a wonderful and challenging character to play around with, I've really been focusing on trying to make her seem 'real'- as many of the characters I've played previously have been big comic characters or emotionally raw tragic Greek characters. At the same time, there are comic moments and she is a very dramatic character, so it's been challenging trying to obtain that balance.

#### THREE SISTERS

The characters in this play and the relationships between them are very complex. Do you think any of them, including yourselves, are 'bad' people?

**QUILLAN**: I think it depends which way you look at it, the characters in this play are so complex and layered that you could dissect them so many different ways and come up with many different answers, I have different opinions of all the character and the play as a whole every time we do a rehearsal. I generally don't think that my character is an actively bad person, however I do think he is thoroughly apathetic and wrapped up in his own world to the point that his actions do hurt other characters in the play.

**MERY:** Wrapping my head around all the different complicated dynamics between the characters has been difficult. Initially, I think it's easy to label some characters as 'bad' people, as some of their actions seem completely heartless; however, I don't really think any of the characters are innately 'bad' (including Natasha who admittedly makes some... questionable choices). But it is clear to see how the characters are products of their environment and how that shapes their actions and personalities-acting selfishly but not necessarily making them 'bad' people.

This production will be set in 1900's Russia, the same time the play was written. What will a modern audience relate to and take away from the show?

**QUILLAN**: I think that the characters and the relationships between them are very current and fresh and many of the themes within the play related directly to people in this day and age.

I believe that a modern audience will still connect to the characters and the narrative and that they will still take away something meaningful at the end of the show despite it being set years ago and many miles away.

**MERY:** I think the overall struggle and feeling of lost hope in the play is timeless and universal, despite the context of it. I hope the audience will take away the importance of living a passionate life and hopefully they won't feel too disheartened afterwards!!

## **EDWARD'S BOYS**



Edward's Boys returns to Playbox with a production of 'The Maydes Metamorphosis'. Founded in 2005, the boy's company from King Edward VI school, Stratford-upon-avon have been performing rarely-seen plays from the repertoire of the early modern boys' companies. Directed by Perry Mills, these performances allow contemporary audiences to experience plays often forgotten, performed by a company of boy players as the Elizabethans would have. Whilst the text is kept untouched, the company adds a conte,porary flare to their staging for modern audiences.

Edward's boys have toured extensively, performing for and collaborating with the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge, Théâtre d'O, Montpellier, the Royal Shakespeare Company Swan and Other Place Theatres, and the Globe, London.

The Maydes' Metamorphosis is an anonymous Elizabethan comedy, and was last performed by Paul's boys in 1600. It follows Ascanio, the son of a duke, searching for his love in a magical forest which is home to God's, Goddesses, fairies, fools and magicians. Naturally, confusion, deception, and adventure ensues.
